New Meat and Poultry Letterhead Certificates Required

Report Highlights:

The National Service of Health, Food Safety, and Food Quality (SENASICA) provided clarification on the appropriateness of U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) Letterhead Certificates that must accompany shipments of certain meat and poultry as well as related products exported from the United States to Mexico. SENASICA indicated that new Letterhead Certificates must accompany all shipments arriving at the border when an agreement has been reached between the two governments (see accompanying product list) unless it was certified prior to Mexico's Nov. 22, 2011, communication. Products have been held up at the border if they are not accompanied by the new certificate.

General Information:

On December 6, 2011, SENASICA's Import and Export General Directorate announced that between now and December 15, 2011, Mexico will only be accepting the newest version of the FSIS Letterhead Certificates that were agreed upon and included in SENASICA's official communication 0805/11 and dated November 22, 2011. If shipments are not accompanied with these new Letterhead Certificates they will likely be held up at the border until a new certificate can be issued. The Letterhead Certificates have been posted on USDA's FSIS Export Library and the Spanish requirements are posted on SENASICA's website under the Modulo de Consulta de Requisitos Zoosanitarios para la Importacion (MCRZI). Previously, it was thought that Mexico would allow both the new and the previous versions of Letterhead Certificates through December 15, 2011.

It is important to note that if a shipment of a relevant product was certified prior to November 22, U.S. exporters should inform USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) in Mexico (agmexico@fas.usda.gov and Tel: +52 55 5080 2532) so that the office can work with SENASICA and facilitate the trade of these shipments.

It is critical that industry know and understand that all shipments arriving on or after December 16, 2011, must be certified with the new documentation requirements. The U.S. Government is continuing to work with SENASICA to reach an agreement on appropriate language for Letterhead Certificates for additional meat and poultry and related products (specifically those for beef and multi-species products) so as to comply with the *Hoja de Requisitos Zoosanitarios (HRZs)*. On December 1, 2011, SENASICA granted an extension to the implementation period for these additional products with the hopes that a final agreement can be reached before December 15, 2011. It remains in question as to what will happen to shipments of products without an agreed upon Letterhead Certificate after December 15, 2011.

The FAS Offices in Mexico encourage all interested parties to be in compliance with the new documentation requirements by the stipulated dates so as to avoid any trade disruption, as SENASICA will maintain only a small number of technical staff in their offices when the Mexican Government shuts down activities on December 16, 2011, for the holiday season. SENASICA has reported that technical staff are neither authorized nor able to make decisions or rulings in the case of a non-compliance with the HRZs and shipments, therefore, will need to await the return of authorized staff on January 3, 2012.

As a follow up on SENASICA's official communication B00.02.03.01.02.-0780, dated November 9, 2011, the teleconferences held with FSIS Dr. Juan Rodriguez and to the emails received at this Area Directorate containing the proposed models of FSIS Letterhead Certificates to comply with the Zoo sanitary requirements of the new HRZ system (MCRZI), I would like to inform you, once the analysis has concluded, that we have reached to the following conclusion:

The guarantees established in the of FSIS Letterhead Certificates models for the import of Pork offal (other than organs); pork offal (organs); pork cooked or smoked bacon; pork fat and lard; raw poultry meat; poultry offal (other than organs); raw poultry offal (organs); ovine/caprine offal (other than organs); ovine/caprine offal (organs); thermally process poultry; poultry edible fats; pork, carcasses, raw meat; processed egg products; poultry dried meat; poultry cooked or smoked bacon and pork skin popping are considered acceptable. We will inform all personnel from the Phyto Zoo sanitary Inspection General Directorate, at the points of entrance, its immediate enforcement as follows:
